The Cotopaxi Colony.

In discussing the affairs and condi-
tion of the colony of Russian Jews at
Cotopaxi, in Fremont county, Meadors,
Witkowski, Kohn, Strass and Davidson
seem to have completely worsted the
wily Mr. Sattiel and to have exposed a
scheme that ought to make the latter
hide his head for shame. The four gen-
tlemen named are among the most re-
sponsible of Denver's citizens, and their
statement of the case will certainly be
accepted as showing the true condition
of affairs. The effort of Mr. Schwartz to
obtain more money from the relief so-
cieties in New York, on the plea that a
system of irrigation is to be put in opera-
tion at once at Cotopaxi so that the lands
may be made productive, will undoubt-
edly fail—as it should.

Meanwhile these poor people, who have
been shamefully deceived and imposed
upon, are objects of charity, supported
wholly by contributions from their coun-
trymen in Denver. There is nothing
encouraging for them in the future, if
they remain at Cotopaxi, and the Jews of
Denver will make arrangements to re-
move them to some location where there
is a chance for them to earn a livelihood.
They are willing and anxious to work,
and all they ask is to be placed where
they can make money to supply their
necessities. It is to be hoped that before
the opening of spring the poor refugees
at Cotopaxi will be relieved from the
embarrassing situation in which they
are now placed.
